Answer any two questions.

- 1. "Identities also involve the circulation (and disruption) of cultural meanings, objects, and identities that are at the heart of struggles over the definition of a collective reality." Discuss with detailed reference to any one of the texts/performance texts that you have studied this semester. (Please note that you cannot address the same text in your next answer.)
- 2. 'Women's bodies reproduce nations, not only biologically, but also culturally and symbolically; their bodies become markers for the construction and maintenance of what Benedict Anderson calls imagined communities.'

Critically analyse the above quotation with reference to *D'Amma* as written and performed by D'Lo.

- 3. Discuss with detailed reference to the text *Running in the Family* how Ondaatje explores the imaginative as a legitimate almost necessary space of experience.
- 4. Reflecting on the short stories by Arab American writers <u>and/or</u> the performance poetry of Suheir Hammad titled *First Writing Since*, examine how this kind of contemporary writing is crucial to provoking a more complex reading of the limitations and tensions surrounding the determination of Arab American subjectivity.
- 5. Edward Said in *Reflections on Exile and Other Essays* writes: "...exile is strangely compelling to think about but terrible to experience. It is the unhealable rift forced between a human being and a native place, between the self and its true home: its essential sadness can never be surmounted."

Using this quotation as a reference point, reflect on the specificity of land and memory within the experiences of exile you encountered in *Exile* by Jamila Hashimi and *You Must Set Forth at Dawn* by Wole Soyinka.

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
