B. That being said, even if we understand what "the law" is, it doesn't mean it always functions in a predictable way (although that's the goal). After all, prosecutors choose whether to bring charges against defendants, so committing a crime doesn't

	necessarily lead to prosecution. And while we might be entitled to a government service—a Social Security payment, for example—that doesn't help much when the Social Security Administration denies a claim. The reality is, laws are applied by real people in the real world, so things don't always play out as perfectly as we might want or expect.

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## Most opposition to abortion relies on the premise that the fetus is a human being, a person, from the moment of conception. The premise is argued for, but, as I think, not well. Take, for example, the most common argument. We are asked to notice that the development of

a human being from conception through birth into childhood is continuous; then it is said

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that to draw a line, to choose a point in this development and say "before this point the thing is not a person, after this point it is a person" is to make an arbitrary choice, a choice for which in the nature of things no good reason can be given. It is concluded that the fetus is, or anyway that we had better say it is, a person from the moment of conception. But this conclusion does not follow. Similar things might be said about the development of an acorn into an oak tree, and it does not follow that acorns are oak trees, or that we had better say they are. Arguments of this form are sometimes called "slippery slope arguments"— the phrase is perhaps self-explanatory— and it is dismaying that opponents of abortion rely on them so heavily and uncritically.
