PART A

- 1. Creative narratives that document stories of violence can evoke compassion, heighten awareness, and provide a more comprehensive understanding of the experiences. To what extent does this statement apply to Seam? Discuss.
- 2. Critically analyse Tarfia Faizullah's decision to provide two parallel sections in *Seam*, each consisting of snippets from interviews with Birangona women, and her own notes.

PART B

- 3. Discuss the themes of abduction and forced disappearances in relation to a selection of <u>up to three</u> poems on civil conflicts in Sri Lanka.
- 4. Using up to three poems from those you have studied, analyse how the concept of identity is interrogated and deconstructed against a backdrop of ethnic conflict.

PART C

- 5. Critically review the novel *Stories* by Charulatha Abeysekara Thewarathanthri, with reference to <u>up to two</u> themes.
- 6. Argue for or against the view that *Stories* is a highly contrived text that on the one hand resorts to tokenism in the way that it represents the civil war/ethnic conflict and on the other eroticizes the Sri Lankan context, making detailed reference to the text.
